To the Editor

It was with great disappointment that the production of 'The Legend of Ben Hall' had to cancel our day of filming at the Ellis property at Eugowra. We were very much looking forward to utilising the magnificent landscapes that were on offer, and were most appreciative of the enthusiasm and generosity of all those who were going to provide horses and equipment.

However, during our NSW shoot we ran into some unforeseen and unwanted problems that severely compromised the production, both financially and personally. Whilst we were able to navigate these problems to a point, the unfortunate fallout of these problems was that we had to cut our NSW shoot 2 days earlier than planned and return to Victoria to salvage the situation. It was not only at Eugowra, we also had to cancel some filming in Jugiong as well.

The harsh reality of making films on a low-budget is that when big problems arise, we do not have the financial means or staff to maintain our plans. We take many things on good faith, and when people do not come through as promised, sadly it affects everyone. We had to 'roll with the punch' on this one, and unfortunately, the generous people at Eugowra were affected along with us.

We ask all those in the Eugowra community accept our sincerest apologies for having to cancel last minute, and understand we were in a very difficult situation in which we had no other choice.

It would not be appropriate or professional to lay out the

gritty details of what led to these unfortunate circumstances, but rest assured it was not a decision made lightly and without serious consideration. We did our best to explain the situation at the earliest possible moment to those at Eugowra.

We thank everyone at Eugowra for their support, and we too remain deeply disappointed that we were not able to film up there as planned. Such is the unpredictable and precarious nature of independent filmmaking.

For any persons in Eugowra who were scheduled to be involved in the film and incurred any expenses in their preparation, we ask that you contact us with your receipts so we can reimburse you.

I hope this letter sheds light on this unfortunate situation. We understand the disappointment of those at Eugowra who were excited about their community being involved in the film. A "thank you" to the Eugowra community and those individuals were going to partake in the production will still appear in the films credits and free copies of the completed film will be also be distributed amongst them.

Notes from the Happy Gardener



In recent weeks, driving along all roads in the area, one hasn't been able to help but look in awe at the paddocks of the beautiful bright yellow of the canola crops and also in many areas the gorgeous wattles have been giving us their yearly flush of beauty. They have been stunning and brighten the bush and roadside like no other plant. Of course, like many of the canola crops, the wattles are losing the brilliance of their earlier fiesta-like blooms but some are still quite lovely.

I recently read the story of the first Wattle Day which has its beginnings in the years leading up to Federation and of the debate over which symbols should represent the new Commonwealth. Promoted by a number of organisations, wattle was seen by these bodies to be Australia's floral emblem and the first Wattle Day was held on 1st September, 1910. It was reported that much sentiment was involved in the celebrations of the time and the following was expressed in newspaper publications at the time,

"To the native born Australian the wattle stands for home, country, kindred, sunshine and love – every instinct that the heart most deeply enshrines"

In the years that followed, the wattle was increasingly seen by many more people as the country's unofficial national flower and it was reported that many letters to loved ones fighting overseas in World War 1 enclosed sprigs of wattle as remembrance of home. Towards the end of the 1930s, Wattle Day lost its momentum and thus fell into decline until a reawakening of interest in national identity in the 1980s.

In 1988 wattle became the national flower of Australia, followed a few years later by the gazetting of its special day.

Australia is home to over 900 different wattle species, distributed across all regions. They have a wide range of height and habit. All are evergreen, most are winter and spring flowering but there are some which flower during the other seasons of the year. The blooms come in a whole range of almost white or cream to the brightest yellow, depending on the species.

In general, they are fast growing, many have a short life span but there are a few which live quite a long life, eg Acacia Elata, which will grow into a fairly large tree.

Because of their reasonably quick growth they can make worthwhile investments for fast hedging, windbreaks, screening and nursery plants.

By this, I mean grow a slower growing tree under the wattle, the wattle protects the slower growing tree from the elements of frost, hot winds and parching sun and

because the wattle is a legume and produces nitrogen into the soil, it is an ideal nanny tree. By the time the wattle comes to the end of its life span, the small tree is generally well established and can fend for it self.

Some species of wattle seeds are popular for adding in cooking recipes.

There are many species suitable for growing in this area so check out the local suppliers. I have always preferred to purchase them in tube stock size as they adapt quickly to their surrounding conditions.

In my opinion the Acacia, commonly known as the wattle is a very useful and worthwhile plant when used in the right place.

Like the wattles, the daffodils are coming to the close of their blooming season and its time to think about growing a few summer flowering bulbs and tubers such as rain lilies, tiger lilies, dahlias and of course many others, also start growing seeds of summer flowering annuals and vegetables. As your spring flowers begin to fade your new annuals will be ready to slot straight into the bare spots.

Petunias, marigolds, zinnias, portulacas and cosmos are just a few heat tolerant and colourful beauties for sowing now.

Vegetables include parsley, basil, lettuce, rocket, beetroot and many more.

Let nature do the work

With Spring already here, generally a host of garden pests nearly always follow soon after, especially aphids and caterpillars but before getting out the chemicals, hold off for a little while to let the beneficial insects such as hoverflies and lacewings build up their numbers and have a chance to hunt down pests.

More tips

Epsom salts is a good pick-me-up for many plants. Water plants with a solution of 1 teaspoon dissolved in 1 litre of water.

Spraying plants which are susceptible to fungal problems with a copper based spray will show reward and adding some liquid fertiliser to this will promote even better reward.

Save used coffee grounds and tea leaves to place around acid loving plants.

Save the water from cooking vegetables, cool and water begonias. They really like it.

A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY



Horse Teams in the Peak Hill District by Wilf Norris

After sending in to the newsletter a story about tractors taking over from horse teams on the wheat farms, I drove back to my old home ground and many memories came back to me, especially the horse teams that worked there in the 1940's.

In 1942, at 14 years of age I started driving my father's 10 horse team and finished in 1949 at the age of 22 years. A tractor was bought and my father gave me the horses and I still have some of the breed today.

During these years I got to know all the farmers that drove horse teams in the district east from Peak Hill to the Harvey Ranges down to Hadiner Creek and along the Newell Highway back to Peak Hill.

This was an area of about six miles wide by 11 miles long.

310 horses worked in this area growing wheat. They averaged 200- 400 acres per team depending on the size of the team.

The machinery they mainly used behind the teams were:

- were 10 disc and 14 disc plough
- 15 and 18 tine scarifiers
- 14, 15 & 16 run combines
- 8 & 10 foot headers

What if the Church closes?

The Church in question is the local Anglican Church.

Remember the Church is not the building, but the people.

Whether or not you have any affiliation with the Anglican Church you have most probably heard of the situation between the Diocese of Bathurst, of which we are a parish, and the CBA (Commonwealth Bank).

Some time ago the internal banking system of the diocese borrowed \$40,000,000.00 from the CBA to use for building and setting up two new schools and other needs, not knowing that the rural recession and a ten year drought would leave the diocese in a position where the repayments could not be met. Following the sale of the school buildings to the Sydney Diocese who will continue the operations at Orange and Dubbo. there is still a shortfall of \$24,000,000.00

The parishes have been asked to provide the money to pay a team of external lawyers to challenge the CBA regarding their pursuit of the debt. This, in itself, will not be a small amount and some parishes are experiencing great difficulty providing the amount for which they were assessed. The number of people who have showed their allegiance to the Anglican Church on the general Census is used as a basis for the assessment. Eugowra and Gooloogong Parish is assessed on 500 persons.

The annual meeting of the Synod, or 'parliament' of the Western NSW Anglican Church, was held at Bathurst Goldfields recently (September 20-21).

The Synod comprises the clergy of the diocese and two lay representatives from each of the 30-plus parishes in the region giving a total membership of just over 100.

The legal battle the diocese is engaged in is not just a matter of paying external lawyers. Tens of thousands of documents have had to be produced, letters written, applications to be made, questions to be answered, and other court costs met. General Manager Graham Higham and the Bishop's PA Erik Bieniek have been working nearly fulltime on this. The Bishop does about 30 hours per week on related work and the diocese has employed another casual person to help. Then, particularly because of historic abuse claims our Professional Standards budget is now about \$100,000 per year.

Bishop Ian drew this link: that through our service the church discovers its purpose and the people of God find their fulfilment. Service leads to purpose. Leads to fulfilment!

CHALLENGING TIMES: Bishop Ian Palmer's Presidential Address to Syond spelt out the difficulties facing the diocese. At the heart of it was a question asked of every parish, church and the diocese itself: "How does your church, your parish, our diocese, serve our communities, towns, rural areas and cities?"

I will leave the question with you.

October Recipe



Buckwheat and Soba Noodle Salad



Ingredients

- 1 carrot, peeled and sliced into ribbons
- 1 cucumber, halved and sliced into ribbons
- 1 cup rice wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 250g buckwheat soba noodles. Available in the Asian section of the supermarket
- 3 spring onions, chopped into thin strips
- 1 bunch coriander
- 1 bunch mint
- 1/2 bunch dill
- 1/2 Chinese cabbage, finely shredded
- 2 tabs sesame seeds, roasted
- 1 large red chilli, finely sliced

Method

Combine vinegar, brown sugar in a small saucepan. Dissolve sugar. Reduce slightly, cool. Once cooled pour over carrots and cucumber. Pickle them for around 15 mins. Then drain.

Follow directions on soba noodle pack in how to cook them, once cooked set aside in a large bowl and toss them with coriander, mint, pickled vegetables, cabbage, spring onions, sesame seeds, chili and the dressing. If you're wanting to add something else, prawns or shredded chicken would work really nicely with this dish.

Dressing

- 1 tbsp. honey
 - 1/4 cup soy
 - 1/4 cup rice wine vinegar
 - 3 tbsp. olive oil
- Combine all ingredients.

Parkinson's Disease (PD)

The second most common neurological condition in Australia but remains one of the least understood in terms of its cause.

Parkinson's disease is a progressive, degenerative neurological condition that affects a person's control of their body movements. It is not contagious and not fatal.

It is normally diagnosed between 50-60yrs old but can appear in people as young as 30yrs.

Two famous people with PD are the Actor Michael J Fox and Boxer Muhammad Ali. There is a suggestion that the repeated blows to the head caused the damage to Muhammad Ali but there is no known cause for PD yet.



The progressive degeneration of nerve cells in the middle area of the brain causes a lack of **dopamine**, a chemical messenger necessary for smooth, controlled movements. The symptoms appear when about 70 per cent of the dopamine-producing cells have stopped working normally.

PD cannot be cured, but the symptoms can be managed. When someone is diagnosed with PD it is devastating for them and their family. Unfortunately they often think of the worst scenario and imagine that their life will be unbearable. What we need to remember is that every person with PD will have a different experience. Some

will be severely affected and others will maintain independent and productive lives.

Symptoms of Parkinson's disease

The type, number, severity and progression of Parkinson's disease symptoms vary greatly. Every person is affected differently. Some of the main symptoms are:

- Tremor (shaking)
- Rigidity (muscle stiffness)
- Bradykinesia (slowness of movement)
- Freezing
- Stooped posture
- Shuffling gait
- Micrographia (small handwriting)
- Lethargy.

Medications for people with Parkinson's disease

There is no 'best' drug treatment for Parkinson's. Each person has different symptoms, disease progression, lifestyle and physical tolerances. All of these factors will affect the timing, type, dose and combinations of medication.

As the disease progresses, medication will need to be reviewed and altered. Medication will help to alleviate symptoms, but will not alter the progression of the symptoms over time.

What is *freezing*?

Many people with mid-stage to advanced PD experience "freezing." *Freezing* is the temporary, involuntary inability to move. Not all people with PD experience *freezing* episodes, but those who do have a greater risk of falling. The problem can occur at any time, and some people are more prone to *freezing* episodes than others. Usually, *freezing* only lasts a few seconds.

It may feel like your feet are stuck in place, or it may be difficult to get up from a chair.

Freezing may also affect other parts of the body or your speech.

What causes *freezing*?

The cause of *freezing* is unknown.

In patients that experience it, *freezing* mostly happens when they are having an “off” period or are due for their next dose of dopaminergic medication.

Are there tricks that might help to get moving again?

Many people with PD may notice that different tricks help to alleviate a freezing episode. They include:

- Being aware of *freezing* triggers and preparing strategies in advance.
- Marching or goose stepping (swinging the leg high and parallel to the ground with knees locked)
- Shifting the weight of the body from one leg to another
- Listening to music and stepping with the rhythm (wearing a radio or mp3 player can be helpful)
- Humming, singing, or counting
- Imagining a line to step over or focusing on a target on the floor to step on
- Using a mobile laser device to create a line in front of you to step over
- Turn by walking half a circle or square instead of by a pivot turn

How can a friend or family member help me during this time?

- Remain calm. Do not rush or push the individual during a *freezing* episode.
- Wait patiently for several seconds to see if the episode passes.
- If the person is unable to move without assistance, try placing your foot perpendicular to the person and ask

them to step over it.

- Help rock the person from side to side.
- Encourage the individual to try marching or counting

Exercise and Parkinson’s disease

Evidence suggests that regular exercise can improve some symptoms of Parkinson’s disease and improve quality of life.

Benefits of regular exercise with Parkinson’s disease

- Greater muscle strength and flexibility
- Increased cardiovascular fitness
- Improved coordination and balance
- Improved posture
- Reduced muscle cramping
- Greater confidence in performing daily activities
- Reduced stress levels
- Improved joint mobility.

Things to remember

- Parkinson’s disease is a manageable condition.
- No two people with Parkinson’s disease will experience the condition the same way, so management will also vary.
- A neurologist is the best person to see if you have Parkinson’s disease – your GP can arrange this.
- Good management is a combination of medication and multidisciplinary support.
- Regular exercise can improve some of the symptoms of Parkinson’s disease.

I am extremely honoured to be Mayor of Cabonne.

NEW MAYOR

Cabonne Council now has a new Mayor, Michael Hayes, who last month said if rezoning was what the Eugowra residents wanted, then they should have it. We hope Mayor Hayes will continue to support this principle!

Meanwhile action is hotting up in the attempt by a local group plotting to have Eugowra “go west”. A meeting was held last week, and another letter written to Paul Toole, Minister for Local Government asking for Eugowra to leave Cabonne Council area and come under the jurisdiction of Forbes.

The threat of amalgamation is certainly making big Councils like Orange salivate at the thought of getting their hands on small Councils like Cabonne with its “shed full of hay”!

ANOTHER ONE BITES THE DUST

An old cottage in Cheshire Street is the latest dwelling in Eugowra to be demolished under the NSW/ Cabonne Flood Buy Back Scheme.

Eugowra residents wishing to sell their homes and move out of the floodway have no choice but to sell

to Council, to then see their old home demolished.

My estimate is that seven homes in the Eugowra floodway have now been demolished in a scheme to move people out of the Mandagery Creek floodway without disadvantaging them financially.

One of the unfortunate conditions of this NSW Government scheme is that once the dwelling is bought by Council, it must be demolished and the land left vacant.

Another problem with this scheme is that houses are demolished without any attempt by Council to recoup costs through salvage and resale of materials such as leadlight windows, old doors, fixtures and fittings, etc. Instead the whole dwelling is smashed to bits and taken “away” on a truck to the.....tip: not very PC in this day and age!

Yet another community objection to this scheme is that the residents who participate in this buy-back scheme may take the money and run – move away from Eugowra, thereby adding to the reduction in the town population.

But perhaps the worst objection is that NSW Government & Cabonne Council refuse to consider alternatives, and continue to offer “a one size fits all” UNSATISFACTORY solution for our town.

An alternative, which remains on Cabonne’s “NO” list, but which has actually been employed effectively in two Eugowra floodway dwellings is the raising or demolishing and rebuilding of homes up above flood height.

In 2008 the then Chairman of Eugowra Promotion and Progress Association Bob Roach commented:-
“EPPA has previously submitted to Council its concerns regarding the administration of this[buy-back and demolish]scheme. It has the potential to create a wasteland between the eastern and western halves of the town as Council appears to have no future plans for the flood-compatible use of the land thus acquired.”

“Infrastructure such as roads, electricity, telephone, water and sewer mains will remain and need to be maintained at ratepayer and consumer expense. The matter of additional flood force on remaining residential and commercial properties when the buffering effect of these structures is removed has also been raised by residents.”

“EPPA’s position is that in view of the relative infrequency of major flooding, its short duration and the warning systems now in place, new dwellings with suitably

elevated floor levels and properly engineered sub-structures should be permitted on this valuable land,”

Council staff reportedly raised three issues to counter this argument:

Homeowners will carry out unapproved renovations to convert the lower level of the new building to habitable space.

Mr Roach's reply: **Surely it is Council's job to monitor and regulate building works under any circumstances;**

Residents will be tempted to ride out floods rather than evacuate, thereby placing emergency service crew members at risk if later evacuation becomes necessary.

Mr Roach's reply: **It is my understanding that the emergency services and the NSW Police have ample powers to enforce any official evacuation order. Council can also impose a condition of development approval requiring evacuation in any declared flood event;**

That Council may face litigation if a building design is found wanting in a flood and damage occurs.

Mr Roach's reply: **If Council follows normal practice and requires all new structural work outside the scope of the Building Code of Australia to be professionally designed by a practising structural engineer it will be well protected, as will the**



homeowner by the engineer's professional indemnity insurance.

The “raised dwelling” option, however, remains unsupported by State and local government funding and so the full cost of this option must be borne by the owners.

Maybe it's time for us to take another look at this issue, before we have “a wasteland between the eastern and western halves of the town”?
